We decided to protect our home with fire sprinklers for many reasons. The first is life safety. We wanted more time to ensure our family could evacuate safely. Our daughter Kelsey has Multiple Sclerosis and is currently doing great. If she relapses or has any issues, I don't want to worry that she won't be able to get out of the house.

It's important to "walk the walk" if I am going to "talk the talk." Members of the fire service know better than anyone else the dangers of fire. The quicker we extinguish fires, the less we have to deal with cancer-causing contamination and potential injury. Home fire sprinklers mean less exposure for the firefighters and fire investigators. Call them incentives or trade-ups – these locally negotiated developer benefits are resulting in sprinkler installations and improved life safety in more jurisdictions each year.
